New Road Changes Will Protect Families

New road safety changes designed to protect Territory families have come into force, the acting Transport Minister Chris Burns said today.

“These changes will save lives and reduce the unnecessary road trauma on Territory roads,” Dr Burns said.

“One person is killed and nine seriously injured on our roads every week. I’m confident that over time, the new traffic regulations will reduce these unacceptable statistics.”

Drink driving, speed and fatigue, coupled with people not wearing seatbelts and motorists running red lights will be targeted with increased fines.

Speed limits will also be reduced to 130km/h on the Stuart, Arnhem, Victoria and Barkly highways. A 110km/h limit will apply on all other roads – unless otherwise signposted.

“I know some Territorians don’t like the changes, but the results on the Lasseter Highway over the past four years speak for themselves,” Dr Burns said.

“Since a 110 km/h speed limit was introduced on that highway in 2001, the number of deaths has been cut by 38%.

“Getting drivers to slow down works.”

Dr Burns pointed to the Territory’s zero holiday road toll, citing it as a good example of motorists doing the right thing.

“I urge everyone who is on the road this New Year season to continue to take care and drive safely,” he said.

“The Territory has often had holiday seasons with no deaths but has been unable to sustain that good record throughout the year – that must change.”

Dr Burns said new traffic regulations have been introduced and police have been given increased resources in the form of a \$1.4 million Traffic Branch.

“It’s now up to motorists to do the right thing,” he said.

“A safer Territory is in all our hands.”

FACT SHEET

Changes to Road Rules on 1 January, 2007

The following changes form part of a package to make our roads safer for all Territorians.

Penalties

Penalties for a range of road safety related offences will be increased:

- drink driving infringement penalties for offences under 0.08 will double
- speeding infringement penalties will double and a new infringement penalty of \$500 for travelling more than 45 km/h above the speed limit will be introduced
- seatbelt penalties will double
- penalties for disobeying red traffic lights will double and penalties for disobeying yellow traffic lights will be increased
- penalties for not displaying an L or P plate when required will double

Fail to obey red traffic light	\$120	\$240
Fail to obey yellow traffic light	\$80	\$100
L & P plate penalty:

Speed Limits

- A 130 km/h speed limit will apply where signed on the Stuart, Barkly, Victoria and Arnhem Highways.
- A new default 110 km/h limit will apply on all other rural roads unless otherwise signposted.
